
"Continuous Quality Management in the Writing Center"

WENDY BISHOP

I was born in Japan in 1953, grew up in southern California, and attended college in northern California at the University of California, Davis where I received an M.A. in English/Creative Writing (1976) and an M.A. in English/Teaching English (1979). After teaching a year at Bayero University in Kano, Nigeria, I returned to teach at Northern Arizona University before moving to Tsaile, Arizona. I worked for three years at Navajo Community College in Tsaile as an administrator and English instructor. From 1985 to 1989, I taught writing at the University of Alaska, Fairbanks. I completed a Ph.D. in English/Rhetoric in 1988 at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. Currently, I live in Tallahassee, Florida, with my son and daughter, and teach writing at Florida State University. I have traveled extensively in Mexico, Guatemala, Peru, Europe, North and West Africa, and the southwest United States and often write about those locations and about Alaska.

My poems have appeared in many U.S. and Canadian journals, among them The American Poetry Review, The Yale Review, Western Humanities Review, Massachusetts Review, College English, Fiddlehead, and The Dalhousie Review. In 1980 a chapbook, Second Nature, was published by Tideline Press and in the same year I won the Joseph Henry Jackson Award for a poetry manuscript in progress. Stories have appeared or are forthcoming in Cream City Review, Permafrost, Sundog, Western Humanities Review and other journals and nonfiction in Writing on the Edge and Puerto del Sol.. A new poetry chapbook, Time in the Southwest, is forthcoming from Jumping Cholla Press.

Something Old, Something New, College Writing Teachers and Classroom Change, a research monograph, appeared in 1990 from Southern Illinois Press; Released into Language: Options for Teaching Creative Writing, theory and pedagogy for creative writing teachers, also in 1990, from the National Council of Teachers of English; and Working Words: The Process of Creative Writing, an introductory textbook, from Mayfield Publishing, 1991. Other books include an edited volume, The Subject Is Writing: Essays by Teachers and Students, 1992, Boynton/Cook Heinemann, and a co-edited volume (with Hans Ostrom), Colors of a Different Horse: Rethinking How We Teach Creative Writing, 1994, National Council of Teachers of English.

Current projects include: Ethnographic Writing Research--Writing It Down, Writing It Up, and Reading It (Boynton/Cook Heinemann); Genres of Writing: Issues, Arguments, Alternatives (co-editor with Hans Ostrom, Boynton/Cook); Thirteen Ways of Looking for a Poem: A Sourcebook on Form for Writers and Readers (Harper Collins), Elements of Alternate Style: Essays on Writing and Revision (editor, Boynton/Cook Heinemann); Metro: A Guide to Writing Creatively (co-authored with Hans Ostrom and Katharine Haake, Harper Collins); The WPA and the Culture of English--A Study of University Writing Program Administration (co-authored with Gay Lynn Crossley); The Shape of Fact: Essays on Writing and Relationships (a collection of literary non-fiction essays).

I'm in the third of a three term on the board of directors of Associated Writing Programs and currently serve that organization as co-vice president.
